

Fifty-five years ago, Marion Rawson Vuilleumier founded the Cape Cod Writers Center. Since August 1963, the Center has grown from a regional writing retreat into a nationally recognized literary organization. While best known for its annual summer conference, the Center hosts a series of programs throughout the year, ranging from monthly meetings to

Our Programs Include:

Writers Critique Groups: Genre-specific groups that meet either monthly or bi-weekly to offer feedback and constructive criticism on works-in-progress.

craft-based workshops, critique groups, author talks, and seminars.





Writers Night Out: These lively, informal meetings are open to members and nonmembers for networking, mini-workshops, readings, and craft sessions led by literary and social media experts.

Pathways to Publication: Prominent authors, editors, and social media experts conduct these weekend seminars to help members improve their literary, research, and promotional skills.



Breakfast with the Authors: A continental breakfast, talks by three acclaimed authors, a question/answer session, and a book sale and signing make this one of the Center's most popular programs.



Young Writers Program: Taught by professional authors, this week-long program offers talented students ages 12-18 the opportunity to receive individualized instruction in fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. Held at a nearby public school,

this weeklong workshop, made possible through grants and donations, accommodates young people, grades 7-12.

Books and the World: This popular bi-weekly event showcases local authors and their works in half-hour interviews aired on a community television network.

THREE-DAY COURSES:

Building a Mystery - from Idea to Finished Book Dale T. Phillips Fri.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am In this course, you'll learn about the scope of mystery and the difference in styles. You'll understand the building blocks involved and understand why voice is critical. You'll know the importance of dialogue, structure, clues, and creating a plan for your book.

Key Elements for Successful Screenwriting Janice Pieroni Fri.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am Learn about the key elements of successful screenwriting in this three-session workshop. Day one covers premise, characters, conflict, story structure, plot, subplot, and theme. On day two, you'll learn about developing fascinating characters, approaches to writing dialogue, and finding your genre. Day three looks at screenplay challenges and practical solutions.

The Memoirist as Narrator and Character Richard Hoffman Fri.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am Writing a memoir can be an important way to revisit past events to better understand how, for better and for worse, they have become one's story and identity. This workshop will explore various techniques to craft a well-rounded, coherent representation of the self, a complex character who tells the story and whose name is "I".

Novels for Young Readers Kate Klise

Fri.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am

Charlotte's Web. Harry Potter. Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. Children's novels are not only books, they're entire worlds to the young reader who discovers them. This course will explore the art and craft of building such a world and inhabiting it with believable characters, situations, conflicts, and journeys. Please bring a draft of a first chapter of a novel in progress.

Writing for Emotional Context Ron MacLean

Fri.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am

We all want our stories to resonate with readers. Emotional context is a big part of what makes resonance happen; it's what helps us understand the "so what" of a story's key moments. A climax or collision of forces is a meaningful reading experience only when readers understand the importance of that moment in the character's life. We'll discuss strategies that provide emotional context, look at published examples, and apply them to our work.

Creative Nonfiction: Finding Subjects that Sell James M. Lang Fri.-Sun. 10:45 am-12:45 pm How do nonfiction writers find topics that capture the attention of editors and readers? In this workshop we will consider how to mine our personal experiences for topics, seek stories in our communities and the people around us, and create subject matter from new adventures or life experiments.

Keep'em Laughing Ray Field

Fri.-Sun. 10:45 am-12:45 pm

Even for the most gifted writer, creating genuinely funny work can be a serious challenge. From Twain to Sedaris, we'll look at great humorists, and use assignments to find valuable comedic techniques we to entertain and amuse our readers.

Poetry & the Political Landscape Danielle Legros Georges Fri.-Sun. 10:45 am-12:45 pm



This workshop will examine the poetry of the political from a variety of communities and perspectives. Focusing on work produced in the 21st century, we will explore how writers have addressed such topics as sexism, racism, homophobia, and social disparities – as well as affirmed particular subjectivities. Their poems will serve as models for the writing we will engage in ourselves. You should emerge from the workshop with several new poems.

Writing an Airtight Narrative Lou Aronica Fri.

Fri.-Sun. 10:45 am-12:45 pm

How do you create a story that holds together from beginning to end while keeping readers engaged? Like all good creative work, it requires discipline and a process. In this course, you'll learn how to develop a novel from an idea into a clean, layered – and airtight – narrative.

Writing for Young Adults Marcella Pixley

Fri.-Sun. 10:45 am-12:45 pm

This workshop will help you find your voice and vision as a writer in one of the fastest growing sectors of the publishing industry. We will explore different genres of YA writing and discuss ways to create contemporary, engaging, three dimensional characters. We will also practice writing dialogue that reveals tension and a dynamic, driving storyline that keeps the reader hooked. This workshop will include sessions for sharing and critique.

TWO-DAY COURSES:

Story and Character Arc Michelle Hoover

Sat.-Sun. 8:30-10:30 am

Finding just the right arc for your story and characters is often what makes or breaks a good piece of fiction. This course introduces a combination of the best ideas, examines the ways story and character arcs work hand-in-hand, and discusses how to take inspiration from such structures without reducing fiction to "formula" or undermining your own vision.

Pitches and Queries Panel: Kaylee Davis & Sharon Pelletier Fri. & Sat. 10:45 am-12:45 pm

What makes a great pitch? What kinds of queries are most likely to entice an agent or editor to want to read your manuscript? Led by two agents, this workshop will help you gain knowledge and skills to write pitches and queries that will attract agents and editors who will publish your book.

Creating a Picture Book Kate Klise

Fri. & Sat. 2-4 pm

Picture books are children's first introduction to the world of literature. So how do we write these important stories that engage a young child's imagination? This course will focus on the basics: premise, character, plot, paging, and language. Bring your picture book in progress—or copies of books you love that will inspire you to create the text for your own beloved picture book.

Double-Duty Dialogue Ron MacLean

Fri. & Sat. 2-4 pm

Charles Baxter wrote that "The best and most artful dialogue is marked by the inattentiveness of its characters." Creating dialogue that delivers meaning in a scene is only half the battle; making that dialogue reflect the disconnections, inattentions, and conflicts that are part of human conversation is the other, more difficult, part. In this advanced craft workshop, we'll discuss five strategies to make dialogue more effective. We'll look at published examples, and practice techniques through in class exercises. Bring a draft of one of your stories to work on.

Secrets of Thriller Writing Dale T. Phillips

Fri. & Sat. 2-4 pm

Thriller readers expect a certain type of ride from your novel. In this course we'll focus on how you can give them that experience. We'll survey the tropes and types of thrillers, with examples, then learn to apply effective thriller techniques within your story.

Strategies & Ethics of First Person Narration Richard Hoffman Fri. & Sat. 2-4 pm

Certain ethical questions are inherent in the memoirist's work. Beyond questions of legality and liability are questions of honesty, fairness, loyalty, compassion, and judgment. Using excerpts from recent memoirs, we will explore the writer's responsibility and how several memoirists have answered these questions in their work.

Breaking into Film and Television Writing Janice Pieroni Fri. & Sat. 4:15-6:15 pm

Finding work in film or television is challenging. In Janice's course you'll learn strategies for breaking in. She also will discuss the film and television development process, trends, representation, pitching, and networking.

Crafting Essays That Matter Ray Field

Fri. & Sat. 4:15-6:15 pm

What makes a good essay? What makes a good one even better? Finding a fitting subject and the right way to present your own perspective is the most critical part of the process. We'll discuss some favorite essays and then explore the art of using your sensibility to write original, compelling short and medium length articles in the first person.

Using Memory to Inspire Fiction Marcella Pixley

Fri. & Sat. 4:15-6:15 pm

This course explores how childhood memories and family stories can become catalysts for powerful fiction. We will take inspiration from Sherman Alexie and Sandra Cisneros whose memories sing through the pages of their novels. In-class writing exercises will help us identify our own important memories and then experiment with creating characters who can help us (and our readers) come to terms with what these memories mean. This workshop will include sessions for sharing and critique.

Writing Powerful, Elegant Prose James M. Lang

Fri. & Sat. 4:15-6:15 pm

New writers tend to focus more on story than on word choices, but great writing reflects the choices we make at the word, sentence, and paragraph level. This workshop will help writers develop the craft of writing powerful, elegant prose from the opening sentence to the final period.







ONE-DAY COURSES:

So You Have Your Facebook Page Set Up - What's Next? Leslie Fishlock Fri. 8:30-10:30 am This course will take you from simply having a Facebook Page to blowing it up. Learn about effective posting, content, timing, scheduling, content calendars, being an influencer, and getting more likes & followers. Make Facebook your friend! Great things come to those who work on their social marketing!

All About Agents Noah Ballard

Friday 2-4 pm

Learn how to navigate the process of finding the right agent with professionalism, confidence and business savvy. In this course, you'll learn from an agent about the preferred format of a query letter, identify the right agent for your genre, the rules by which a writer should conduct themselves around agents and how to navigate common questions (e.g. Can I submit to multiple agents at one agency? Should I grant exclusive reads? Can I dictate the process by which an agent submits my work?).

Finding the Right Audience for Your Young Voice Katie Grimm Friday 4:15-6:15 pm Worried about the right age audience for your novel? In this class we'll discuss the differences in voice (not just content) between Middle Grade, Young Adult, and Adult Fiction with young protagonists. Bring the first two pages of your work and learn what writers of all young voices can improve upon.

Keeping a Journal Marcella Pixley

Saturday 2-4 pm

Maintaining a journal can help strengthen your observation, reflection, and focus – three qualities essential to any writer whether you create poetry, fiction, nonfiction, or memoir. Includes examples from inspiring journals and an opportunity to practice journaling techniques. If time and weather permits, we'll spend part of this class outdoors so bring walking shoes.

Changing Trends in Publishing Lou Aronica

Saturday 4:15-6:15 pm

Book publishing today is vastly different than it was ten or even five years ago. Prominent editor and publisher, Lou Aronica, will discuss how technology, market forces, and reader interest have created a new publishing environment. This course is a must for anyone who wants to understand today's publishing climate.

Forensic Investigations Michelle Clark

Sunday 10:45 am - 12:45 pm

Have a dead body in your story? Of course you do! In this class we will cover important details you need to describe your death scenes and the forensic jargon used so your murders can be accurate. You will leave slightly horrified, but educated on what homicides, suicides, and accident scenes truly look like and how investigators solve them.

INTENSIVES:

Lessons from the Novel Incubator Michelle Hoover

Friday 2-6:15 pm

Now in its sixth year, Grub Street's famous Novel Incubator program taught by Michelle Hoover has helped dozens of students revise their novels and prepare them for publication. In this four-hour intensive workshop she will introduce you to the best revision tactics, including how character creates structure, how to establish mystery and tension, how best to construct your settings and scenes, and more.

How to be Effective on Social Media Leslie Fishlock

Saturday 2-6:15 pm

This four-hour course is designed for all levels to explore Digital/Social Media, how to be an influencer, how to gauge your effectiveness through analytics, boost posts, "likes", and build your brand. We will mostly focus on Facebook, but will also cover Instagram & Twitter.

The Cape Cod Writers Center

History of the Cape Cod Writers Center

Writers have long been inspired by Cape Cod's inviting beaches, beautiful vistas, and quaint villages. In 1962 a group of writers called the Twelve O'Clock Scholars decided to honor the Cape's famous literary tradition by founding the Cape Cod Writers Center Conference. Among the earliest presenters were



authors Isaac Asimov, Art Buchwald and Jacques Barzun. Headed by dynamic Cape author Marion Rawson Vuilleumier, the Cape Cod Writers Center Conference first convened at the Craigville Conference Center in Centerville in August 1963.

Over the years the Cape Cod Writers Center Conference produced a literary anthology and hosted workshops, informative panels, evening lectures, and manuscript evaluations by distinguished authors, editors, and professors. By

the 1980s, Vuilleumier and the board of directors had expanded the Center's offerings to include a community television program, *Books and the World*, as well as a Young Writers program and a Writers literary workshop aboard the *Queen Elizabeth 2*. Marge Piercy conducted a workshop in poetry in 1986 and 30 years later, to our delight, returned with her husband Ira Wood.
